Remember the Five Finger Rule

Have your child:

- Choose a book that looks interesting.
- Read the second page.
- Hold up a finger for each word he or she is not sure of, or does not know.

If your child uses all five fingers, you should choose an easier book.

TIP: One way to help a beginning reader is to read them the story first and then have them read it back to you at a later time.

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Easy Readers (Call number ER)

From authors David Adler to Harriet Ziefert, there are more than 2,000 stories to capture the interest of new readers.

Readalongs

Listening to a story refines listening skills and helps to build comprehension. Use these pairs (book and CD) to improve the ability to remember what the story is about and better understand the meaning.

BOB Books (Call number BOB BOOKS)

These books start the earliest readers with carefully chosen letter sounds, words, and short sentences. Each set has a different purpose and range of difficulty.

Guided Reading Levels (Call number GRL)

This collection supports the Howard County Public School System's Guided Reading curriculum. The school curriculum relies upon the Fountas and Pinnell text levels that are used in guided reading lessons and assessments. These non-fiction materials allow the youngest readers to Read to Learn as they Learn to Read.

To find guided reading leveled books, search hclibrary.org as follows:

- In the (all formats) box, SELECT Books.
- In the "What are you looking for?" search box, TYPE "Guided Reading Level X," where X is the level A through P you want.
