

COLORECTAL CANCER OVERVIEW

- Cancer that begins in the colon or rectum is known as colorectal cancer (CRC) or colon cancer
- CRC starts as a pre-cancerous growth called a polyp in the colon or rectum that over time could become cancerous. Not all polyps become cancerous.
- Different types of CRC screenings are used to find pre-cancerous and cancerous polyps





FUNCTIONS OF THE COLON AND RECTUM


- The colon is a part of your digestive system. It helps absorb water and minerals, as well as eliminate waste.
 - The colon is the large intestine
 - The colon is about 5 feet long

The rectum connects the colon to the anus

DEATH RATE BY RACE/ETHNICITY & SEX IN THE UNITED STATES

Colorectal Cancer is the 3nd leading cause of cancer deaths in the United States.

MARYLAND COLORECTAL CANCER SCREENING STATISTICS

- 76.6% of adults age 50-75 reported receiving one or more of the recommended colorectal cancer screening tests in 2020
- In 2021, an estimated 2,550 CRC cases were expected to be diagnosed and 1,050 deaths were expected to occur





HOWARD COUNTY COLORECTAL CANCER SCREENING **STATISTICS**

- 54% of adults age 50-75 had a colonoscopy or sigmoidoscopy within the past 5 years, reported in 2021
 - Between 2018 and 2021 there was an 11% increase in the number of residents that reported that they had never had a colon screening
 - In 2021, 26% of Howard County residents skipped or postponed their routine colonoscopy or sigmoidoscopy due to COVID-19 exposure concerns







Colorectal Cancer Risk Factors







RISK FACTORS RELATED TO BEHAVIORS

- Physical inactivity
- Being overweight or obese
- Smoking/Vaping tobacco
- High consumption of red and/or processed meat + very low fruits and vegetables
- Average of 2-4 alcoholic drinks per day have a 23% higher risk of colorectal cancer than those who consume less than one drink per day







RISK FACTORS RELATED TO HEREDITY & MEDICAL HISTORY

- Personal or family history of polyps, colorectal cancer or other types of cancers
- African American, Jewish or Eastern European descent
- Inflammatory bowel diseases
- Genetic syndrome
- Diabetes
- 45 years or older







AFRICAN AMERICANS & COLORECTAL CANCER

- Compared to Caucasians, African-Americans...
 - Develop colon cancer at a younger age
 - Have decreased access to screening
 - Have more 'aggressive' colon cancer
 - Have reduced survival
 - Have a reduced response to chemotherapy for advanced disease







CRC SCREENINGS NOW START AT AGE 45

• Why?

- Rates of colorectal cancer among people younger than 50 are on the rise.
- It was estimated that in 2020,17,930 people younger than age 50 would be diagnosed with CRC.







Colorectal Cancer Symptoms







SYMPTOMS OF COLORECTAL CANCER (1 of 2)

- No symptoms
- Rectal bleeding, dark stools or blood in or on stools
- Change in bowel movements, narrowing of stool, constipation or diarrhea
- Persistent abdominal pain, gas, indigestion or cramps





SYMPTOMS OF COLORECTAL CANCER (2 of 2)

- Unexplained weight loss
- Loss of appetite, nausea or vomiting
- Chronic fatigue
- Iron deficiency anemia not due to other conditions

Tips for Making the Most Out of Your Screening (1 of 2)

- Check with your insurance plan to find out what benefits are covered for colorectal cancer screening. Sample questions to ask:
 - Does my insurance cover CRC screening?
 - How do I choose a gastroenterologist?
 - Do I need a referral?
 - How much is my deductible/co-pay?





Tips for Making the Most Out of Your Screening (2 of 2)

- 2. Gather information about your family medical history
- 3. Make a list of your current medications
- 4. Let the provider know your preferred language/primary language
- 5. Ask your doctor how often to get screened





Maryland's No-Cost **Colorectal Cancer Screening Program**





PURPOSE

- Increase:
 - Access to care for the at-risk/vulnerable populations
 - Prevention, early detection and diagnosis
 - Timely follow-up and treatment
- Decrease:
 - Health disparities
 - Death rate







MARYLAND CRC PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

- Maryland resident proof required
- Adults age 45 and older with average risk
- Individuals 18 years and older with increased risk with symptoms
- Uninsured, under-insured or insured for navigation services
- Limited income 250% of federal poverty level





MARYLAND CRC SERVICES

- Pre-screening consultation and screening colonoscopy
- Biopsy and laboratory charges
- Surgical consultation
- Case management
- Patient navigation services for insured clients
- Interpreters/Language Line
